


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ABOUT US

Leichhardt Women's Health Centre (LWCHC) was Australia's first Women's Health Centre established in 1974 and has been a leader and innovator in the development and delivery of affordable, holistic, gender and trauma informed health care services for 50 years. We are an accredited service run by women for women. LWCHC is part of a network of women's health centres across NSW (Women's Health NSW).

OUR CENTRE

The centre is funded by Sydney Local Health District (SLHD) and is a registered Public Benevolent Institution Charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) and has been endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) since 2001.

Our multi-disciplinary team offers wrap-around health, education, and support services, including mixed-billing medical clinics specialising in women's health, complementary health clinics including acupuncture and naturopathy, generalist and drug & alcohol counselling, on-site and outreach health education programs, dance movement, yoga and other therapy groups, and community health education and support programs specifically for Vietnamese women. Our services emphasise preventative health and empower women to participate in their own informed health care and related life decisions, providing information that improves health literacy and promotes healthy lifestyle choices.

Our specialised state-wide service called Women Partners of Men who Have Sex with Men offers individual counselling and group support, as well as capacity building and training for other health professionals, health information and research and seeks to reduce stigma and influence health policy.

Our in-house partnerships include a registered psychologist and counselling for adult survivors of child sexual assault in partnership with Full Stop Australia.

We are a proactive presence in the community, partnering with other organisations to broaden our impact, integrate services, and empower women to improve their health, personal and social wellbeing, and safety. LWCHC further assists women to thrive and have meaningful, fulfilling lives through collaboration with government, non-government, business, health, welfare, education, justice and housing sectors.

LWCHC provides services across the inner west LGA and the wider community. While there are areas of affluence in the LGA there are also pockets of significant disadvantage, with the area experiencing significant challenges related to accessing housing and health services. This is due to a combination of high demand, scarcity of resources and high costs.

We offer continuity of care for women who are at risk of poorer health, or who have limited access to the mainstream health care system. Our priorities for access therefore include:

- Women with no or low income, or who are otherwise experiencing financial disadvantage, (including homelessness, and food insecurity);
- Women experiencing or escaping from domestic and family violence;
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander women/ First Nations women:

- Culturally and linguistically diverse women, including refugees and women with interim visas;
- LGBTQIA+ women and non-binary women;
- Women living with disabilities;
- Women living with chronic and complex health conditions, including mental health conditions, drug/alcohol and other addictions, chronic pain, and HIV:
- Women with complex trauma, including those experiencing systemic racism and transgenerational trauma;
- Women with complex caring obligations.
- Women Partners of Men who Have Sex with Men.
- Women who have been subject to sexual violence as a child or adult or both.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT



The past year has been a transformative period for LWCHC as we continued to advance our services, strengthen community ties, and celebrate our rich legacy in women's health. This report reflects the commitment of our Board, staff, and community partners to achieving sustainable growth and

improved outcomes for the women we serve.

Board and Leadership Activities

The Board met ten times during the year, with additional monthly meetings held by the Financial Subcommittee to enhance financial oversight. This has been instrumental in streamlining processes and ensuring we maintain a clear financial roadmap. I want to extend thanks to all Board members, for their time, expertise, and dedication to LWCHC's vision and mission.

Staffing and Program Updates

This year saw the arrival of new staff, such as Kyla Lawson, who took on roles in health promotion and Program Coordinator for Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men and Anti-Violence Project Officer, enhancing our service capacity in critical areas. To maintain seamless operations, we also managed temporary coverage for roles affected by staff leave and welcomed Linda Bates as a locum naturopath, whose contributions were invaluable.

50th Anniversary Celebrations

LWCHC celebrated its 50th anniversary with a deeply meaningful art exhibition, The Thread between Us, held at the Leichhardt Library in March. This exhibition honoured the history and achievements of the centre since 1974, celebrating our feminist roots and community impact. Special events, such as Aboriginal Women's Weaving Workshops and guided tours, enriched the occasion, fostering community engagement and cultural exchange. We extend heartfelt thanks to all who participated and made this event a success, in particular I would like to thank Aunty Jenny Thomsen; The Hon. Jodie Harrison MP, NSW Minister for Women, Seniors and the Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence; Councillor

Philippa Scott, Denele Crozier, Women's Health NSW; Richard Francis-Jones, FJC Studio; Naima, Centre client, Ses Salmond, Manager and the dance and smoking ceremony performed by Jannawi Dance Clan.

Expansion of Services and Infrastructure

Our commitment to improving service accessibility was underscored by the introduction of mixed billing for GP clinics, which generated additional income and bolstered our sustainable medical services. Significant enhancements to infrastructure included the replacement of our firewall in February, funded by the Strengthening Medicare GP Grant, safeguarding our digital security with up-to-date technology. Additionally, we initiated a





partnership with Purpose Accounting to support our financial management needs effectively.

Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men (WPMSM) Program

The WPMSM program continues to provide essential support and resources, expanding outreach through social media and online presence, particularly via a social media campaign that has elevated our online visibility. We launched a series of webinars, supported by evaluations to refine content and engagement. Kyla Lawson's leadership in networking and program presentations has bolstered our outreach, with the WPMSM newsletter and acceptance for a IUSTI Conference poster presentation abstract highlighting our dedication to sexual health advocacy and education.

Non-Fatal Strangulation and Acquired Brain Injury Initiatives

In partnership with Women's Health NSW and other stakeholders, we advanced training on non-fatal strangulation (NFS) and its health implications, particularly for survivors of sexual violence. This critical training included presentations to GPs and other healthcare providers, underscoring our commitment to improving healthcare responses for those affected by gender-based violence. We also expanded our referral pathways, now including Macquarie University's neuropsychology unit, ensuring that survivors receive comprehensive care. NFS also incorporates consensual sexual choking. LWCHC are increasing engagement and participation with youth and adolescent services to provide nonjudgemental harm minimisation education on the practice of consensual sexual choking.

Community Engagement and Networking

The year was marked by extensive networking efforts, with the LWCHC team engaging with organisations like Family Planning Australia, Sydney Women's Counselling Centre, and Positive Life to foster collaboration and drive service development.

Strategic Plan and Theory of Change



In closing, I wish to thank our funders, including the NSW Ministry of Health, SLHD, and PHN, for their unwavering support. Heartfelt thanks also go to our dedicated staff, Board members, and volunteers for their expertise, commitment, and resilience. Together, we look forward to another year of growth, collaboration, and advocacy as we work to realise a healthier, more equitable future for all women.

Welcome to the celebrating 50 years edition of Leichhardt

Women's Community Health Centre's Annual Report for 2023-2024 and in recognition of our 50 years of service, I would like to thank the women activists from the Women's Liberation movement who founded Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre (LWCHC), Australia's first women's health centre. They had the vision to develop a constitution, register as a company, develop a funding submission, and talk to the Whitlam Government under the Community Health Program to establish a community women's health service. These pioneering women were successful and in 1973 received \$33,000 which allowed the doors of LWCHC to open in 1974 with gueues of women lining up the street. This was the same year that the Rape Crisis Centre and Elsie's Women's Refuge were founded too. And none of this would have happened 50 years ago had it not been for the vision and the activism of the Women's Liberation Movement.

From humble beginnings in 1974 with a grant of \$33,000 to now in 2024 where there was a funding enhancement from the NSW Government to support sustainable investment in women's health centres (see funding boost announcement section). It means we can be here for the long term to continue to provide services to women in the community and respond further to

community need. Our women clients are our primary focus and responding to their needs and including lived experience voices in the co-development of services can only enrich our service.

Women's health centres keep women safe, keep women out of hospitals, and make a difference to women's lives every day. Providing services to thousands of women, the Centre's legacy is interwoven with stories of resilience, courage and the positive impact on women's lives. The work at LWCHC has saved women's lives. LWCHC has seen over 250,000 women over the last 50 years and has provided over 1,000,000 occasions of service. Thanks to NSW Health who have funded LWCHC since 1982. Ethos remains true

Leichhardt Women's from the get-go took information, support and services to the community where it was needed and this remains the ethos of the centre today. The intention of the Leichhardt Women's has always been to empower women through information and service delivery in house, in the community (mobile info van in 1976), in community languages (Bitter Medicine Campaign and video on minor tranquillisers translated into five community languages (1983-1987), and to advocate to improve policy and legislation for women to eliminate gender bias in service delivery.

Outreach service delivery model

Outreach medical and nursing clinics were delivered to residents of Malabar Housing estates and the Deli Neighbourhood centre at Mascot in 1980s, providing access to services where transport and other infrastructure were not present. LWCHC is still

providing outreach clinics to communities who find it difficult to access mainstream services. With the SLHD, Leichhardt Women's is providing outreach nursing clinics at Waterloo Neighbourhood Centre, Canterbury Community Centre in Lakemba, Guthrie House, Dr Quan Ngo's clinic in Marrickville, Poet's Corner in Redfern, Newtown Neighbourhood Centre and Common Ground in Camperdown. The outreach service delivery model for community based cervical screening was accepted as a poster presentation for the Cancer Innovations Conference. (See Nursing Outreach Clinics section).

Outreach drug and alcohol counselling is provided at Guthrie House, We help ourselves New Beginnings and Detour House. Outreach community-based support groups for the Vietnamese community includes LWCHC's longest standing Vietnamese Social Support Group who were involved in a great initiative with SLHD Stepping on Program. (Please refer to the Outreach section Stepping on Program).

Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men (WPMSM)

This service has operated from LWCHC since 2001 and provides free and confidential counselling and support groups to women across NSW, who discover or suspect their male partners are sexually active with men. We provide professional development for health professionals. In 2023-2024 we have undertaken a number of strategies to increase the visibility of WPMSM service both for the women with lived experience, health professionals and stakeholders. The focus has been on making the website more user friendly, production of professional development webinars and in service



trainings, quarterly newsletter to our mailing list and social media campaigns. (Please refer to the separate section on WPMSM)

Sexual Violence and Non-fatal strangulation (NFS)

WHC's bring into focus the impacts of violence on women's health and wellbeing and wellbeing. The sexual violence and non-fatal strangulation and acquired brain injury, an innovative impactful initiative from Women's Health NSW. Thanks to Denele Crozier, CEO, Jackie McMillan, Senior Project Officer and Courtney Artridge for spearheading this important work and supporting our centre to create our own policies, protocols and local referral pathways, to ensure that women get the timely help they need. Our two GPs Dr Frances Chen and Dr Melissa Tang appeared in a video about nonfatal strangulation produced by Women's Health NSW. The implementation of NFS in the centre has created a specific Domestic and Family Violence (DFV) and Sexual Violence (SV) role in LWCHC, ensuring that all the health impacts of NFS, DFV and SV are attended to. Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre (LWCHC) celebrated its 50th Anniversary with the official launch of "The Thread Between Us" Art Exhibition at Leichhardt Library on 6 March 2024, nearly 50 years to the day since it's opening on International Women's Day on 8 March 1974. The 40 meticulously designed and curated panels paid tribute to five pioneering and innovative decades of serving diverse communities of women with the themes of services, activism and connecting women.

Proudly affirming its feminist heritage which continues to this day, the exhibit highlights how LWCHC has been

at the forefront of transforming health services from the development of specialist cultural, linguistic, inclusive support groups and services, to pivotal campaigns around access to abortion, birth control, health information, refuges, safe health care, and prevention of violence against women. LWCHC continues to support women to take control of their health, push boundaries and transform health services to better address and respond to the evolving needs of women.

The first panels showed a timeline of achievements and notable events from 1974 – 2024. Twelve panels showcased **Services**, seven panels highlighted

Activism, seven panels celebrated Women - the clients, staff and partner organisations. The last panels showed a re-design of our existing space to take the Centre into the future, accentuating the enduring relevance of Women's Health Centres and the importance of protecting women's services going forward.



ABORIGINAL WEAVING WORKSHOP

An Aboriginal Weaving Workshop was held at Leichhardt Library on 13 March 2024 free to the public as part of our 50th anniversary art exhibition and tied into the theme of the exhibition "The Thread between Us".

Three Aboriginal women elders, Aunty Delphine Leslie, Aunty Nettie Dixon and Aunty Kerrie Whitmore held an Introductory Weaving Workshop for Women to make raffia earrings and start on a basket in honour of our 50th Anniversary celebration of Leichhardt Women's Community Health centre. 14 people attended, including a young girl and her father.

Women expressed delight and gratitude for a chance to attend something most said they wouldn't normally have access to and which they enjoyed so much.

The social impact of this workshop was immense:

- a cancer survivor who had moved from Northern NSW to Sydney for cancer treatment who had no money, reported that this workshop was so nurturing to her.
- a migrant woman who attended had used the LWCHC services from 1997 to 2005 and commented that the centre had saved her life.
- the facilitators feedback was that the women who attended were lonely and this workshop helped to break down social isolation.


The cross pollination of ideas between sister services allowed for innovative and creative ways to support each other in delivering the best services to women that reflect our local communities.

OUR FUNDING - SYDNEY LOCAL HEALTH DISTRICT

In the 2023-24 financial year our funding was provided by Sydney Local Health District (SLHD), under the NSW Ministry of Health NGO Grants Program, for the following programs:

- Women's Health (WH),
- · Alcohol and Other Drugs, and
- Population Health (HIV/AIDS).

The Women's Health Election commitment which arose from the Women's Health NSW Business Case (October 2022) led to an increase in funding to the women's health centres across NSW meant that the centre gained supplementary monies to advance services for women and to ensure sustainability.

Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre (LWCHC) implemented a mixed model of billing in January 2024 to ensure a sustainable clinical service. The introduction of fees helps us maintain our capacity to help all women in need of our care.

Independent income received from donations, and one-off grants support enhanced service delivery through brokerage and continuing education and training for staff and clients, as well as directly subsidising some of the group programs.

WOMEN'S HEALTH PROGRAM

In 2023-2024 there were 6,669 occasions of service and community health education provided to a total of 1,785 clients in the Women's Health (WH) program.

Client demographics:

- 43% of all women attending WH funded services were from CALD backgrounds, and 6% identified as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Isander backgrounds.
- 68% of women attending WH services were on pension/benefits.
- 86% of clients are currently residing in the SLHD.
- 47% of our clients are over 55 years and among this percentage the highest proportion are aged 65-69 years (15%). In the younger cohorts 10% are aged 25-29 years.
- 99% of our clients have complex chronic health care needs.

Practitioners in the WH funded clinical and counselling services recorded 22,688 presenting issues in the WHNSW Database. The highest presenting issues in WH sessions was emotional/mental health (35%), followed by physical health (25%), relationships (16%), legal/financial issues (6%), violence/abuse (5%), gynaecological/urogenital (4%) and social/cultural issues (4%).

There were 2,554 individual nursing, GP, health promotion activities and case management episodes of care, 908 naturopathic and acupuncture appointments and 587 counselling episodes of care.

ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS PROGRAM

The Drug and Alcohol Counsellor delivers counselling, health education and case management/referrals from a harm minimisation perspective to individuals and in group settings. This work is carried out both at the centre and in residential refuges/rehabilitation services and other NGO organisations.

The demographics of those attending the drug and alcohol service in the past year are as follows:

- 14% of women were from CALD backgrounds.
- 14% identified as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander women.
- 80% of women were on pension/benefits.
- 89% of clients are currently residing in the SLHD.
- The highest proportion of clients were aged in the 30-39 age bracket at 39%, followed by 16% of the clients aged 25-29 years and 12% aged 50-54 years.

The two principal drugs of concern used by clients attending the service in the 2023-2024 financial year were methamphetamine (40%) and alcohol (36.5%).

POPULATION HEALTH (HIV/AIDS) – WOMEN PARTNERS OF MEN WHO HAVE SEX WITH MEN SERVICE

The Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men Service (WPMSM) is a state-wide service to NSW residents and has been successfully running for over 22 years at LWCHC. The Service has provided face-to-face counselling, support groups, training and resources for many women and health professionals throughout the years and will endeavour to continue providing this much needed service in NSW.

In the 2023-2024 financial year, there were 95 new clients to the service and 169 counselling appointments in person or via telehealth.

- The age range of clients attending the WPMSM service was highest at 25% in the 45-49 age bracket, followed by 19% of clients in the 30-34 age bracket and 15% aged 50-44 years.
- The majority of the counselling clients were born in Australia at 64%, followed by 7% from the UK and Ireland
- Most clients resided in the West Metro area at 25% followed by Southeast Metro at 13%.

There were 2,828 presenting issues canvassed in the counselling sessions: 44% were emotional and mental health issues and 38% were relationship issues.

The Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men Service continues to touch the lives of women throughout New South Wales and beyond, when they find themselves struggling with relationship changes they weren't expecting and don't know who to turn to.





FUNDING BOOST ANNOUNCEMENT BY NSW HEALTH MINISTER

The NSW Minister of Health Ryan Park MP, NSW Minister for Women & Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Jodi Harrison MP, NSW Minister for Transport Jo Haylen MP, and Member for Balmain Kobi Shetty MP held a Press Conference at Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre (LWCHC) on 12 September 2023 to announce the \$34.3 million funding over 4 years to the 20 NSW Women's Health Centres as per Scenario 2 in the Women's Health NSW Business Case.

Marta Vasquez attended the event on behalf of the LWCHC Board; Denele Crozier, CEO of Women's Health NSW spoke at the event along with Ses Salmond, Manager of LWCHC.


The funding boost means that centres will be able to:

- Increase staff numbers
- Put downward pressure on waitlists for counselling appointments
- Offer healthcare and counselling services to more women
- Adapt services to emerging demographic trends and population growth
- Adapt services to address the complexity of presenting health issues.



A ministerial delegation and media announcement by NSW Premier, The Hon. Chris Minns MP, NSW Minister of Health, Ryan Park MP and the NSW Minister for Women, Seniors and the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence and Sexual Assault, Jodie Harrison MP at LWCHC on the investment in women's health centres occurred on 7 March 2024. The total allocation over four years to LWCHC will be \$1,221,000 ex gst. The ministerial delegation and policy advisors requested a tour of the Centre to meet staff and learn more about the services.

COMMUNITY-BASED HEALTH EDUCATION (OUTREACH)

NURSING OUTREACH CLINICS

In partnership with Sydney Local Health District Priority Populations Program, LWCHC Women's Health Nurse Comfort Danquah raised awareness and uptake of the self-collection Cervical Screening Test (CST) and breast screening in community outreach settings at Newtown Neighbourhood Centre, Common Ground, Guthrie House, Redfern's Poet's Corner and Women and Girls Emergency Centre. Cultural Support Workers (CSWs) and a female Senior Aboriginal Health Worker (SAHW) enhanced cultural safety and patient navigation.

Cervical self-collection was a game changer in helping those who often do not access mainstream services to feel empowered to collect their own sample. This collaboration has supported women from priority populations to access care.

This community outreach screening work was accepted as a poster presentation at the Cancer Innovations Conference in August 2023 in Sydney entitled Community Based Cancer Screening: improving access for priority populations.

STEPPING ON PROGRAM FOR VIETNAMESE WOMEN

Thao Do, LWCHC's Vietnamese Health Educator, worked with Jennie Vien (Diversity Programs & Strategy Hub, Population Health) and Trish Lynch (Health Promotion Unit) from Sydney Local Health District to form a working partnership to run a **Stepping On Program** for Vietnamese women in July 2023 for eight (8) sessions at Campsie Library.

The program is all about building confidence and reducing falls for people over 65 years of age and covered a range of topics including falls and risks, strength and balance exercises, home hazards, safe footwear, vision and falls, safety in public places, community mobility, coping after a fall and understanding how to initiate a medication review.

Twenty (20) Vietnamese women attended and 19 completed the program. All participants enjoyed the sessions as they learned new skills, increased their knowledge, and built the confidence to stay active and independent.

The participants have stated that they would highly recommend the program to their friends and family.

"After participating in the Stepping On program and persistently practicing every day, I now no longer stumble like before. I feel much more confident when walking and living alone."

'FRENCH FLAIR' NIA DANCE MOVEMENT GROUP

Inspired by the up-coming Paris Olympics, the Nia Dance Movement Group led by Sharon Todd- Miller, Dance Movement Therapist enthusiastically responded to the option of French dress-ups for a session. Add some very French music and we were transported to Paris!

Nia (and incorporating Dance Therapy) is a mindful and restorative movement practice which uses many forms of social engagement to create a safe and supportive space for healing of distress, trauma and challenging life circumstances. This includes use of group rhythm, creative expression and improvisation, circle dancing, the structure of choreography, singing/sounding, humour, playfulness, body awareness, mindfulness, relaxation and use of select music in the therapeutic mix.



WOMEN PARTNERS OF MEN WHO HAVE SEX WITH MEN SERVICE

Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men Service (WPMSM) has continued to strengthen its access to services for those with lived experience and in doing so can be immediately agile to this client feedback. The WPMSM service has expanded its reach in its health promotion and education and networking opportunities to ensure that clients, services, and health professionals are aware of our statewide service. The increased visibility through social media campaigns, women partners website and print media and targeted digital banners to the women partners and their male partners has been highly effective at directing important health promotion messages to both women partners and their male partners.

MEDIA CAMPAIGN

WPMSM piloted targeted health promotion campaigns aimed at reducing heterosexual HIV transmission. LOUD Communications, Pink Media and WPMSM developed the advertising campaigns in consultation with Population Health. The Grindr targeted banner displayed Isn't it time she knew and the women's lived experience targeted on Mamamia and Star Observer displayed the banner Is your husband gay?

The industry standard Click Through Rate (CTR) is 0.05%, any higher percentage demonstrates strong engagement and positive ad placement.

First media campaign results:

- The Grindr ad received 0.7% CTR with 166,667 impressions
- Mamamia received 0.32% CTR with 3,500 impressions
- The Star Observer 0.08% CTR, with 3,500 impressions
- "Is your husband gay" broad targeting received 0.07% CTR with 800,000 impressions
- A retargeting of audience attracted 0.9% CTR with 375,000 impressions

This equals 1,348,667 total impressions.

HEALTH PROMOTION

Further Sexual Health information including the benefits of comprehensive sexual health testing has been incorporated into several pages of the website. Now not only does WPMSM have the HIV Landing page, but information on the "About" and WPMSM landing page have also incorporated this information. The data on those who have accessed this Sexual Health information is as follows: 1,037 views of the HIV Landing Page, an additional 6270 views who visited WPMSM landing page and 1,158 views of the About page, have now been provided sexual health information.

WPMSM QUARTERLY NEWSLETTERS AND MAILING LIST

WPMSM have restarted quarterly newsletters with the first being published in June 2024, with 10 organizations currently receiving this newsletter.

RESEARCH

Women Partners of Men who have Sex with Men Service (WPMSM) are in the process of creating a formalised research agreement with UTS, which includes a multi-stakeholder commentary piece as a starting point. It is anticipated that Western Sydney Sexual Health Service plus additional CALD community and health organisations may form a part of this 3-part research plan.



SEXUAL VIOLENCE PROGRAM — NON-FATAL STRANGULATION (NFS) AND ACQUIRED BRAIN INJURY

In this reporting period our staff have improved their knowledge of, and readiness to respond to, non-fatal strangulation, sexual choking, and acquired brain injury. This was done through one round of face-to-face training provided by our peak body, Women's Health NSW, under the Sexual Violence Project Fund. The project, Local pathways for victims and survivors of sexual assault related non-fatal strangulation and acquired brain injury, is a statewide initiative designed to support and strengthen professional understanding and local capacity to respond to sexual assault-related non-fatal strangulation and acquired brain injury

The two-year project, which includes a dedicated site coordinator here at the centre, has also seen us engage with local services to begin building our own multidisciplinary referral pathway. This referral pathway and related organisational protocols will help us improve responses to any women we see who have experienced strangulation, who engage in sexual choking, or who may have an acquired brain injury. The project also includes a dedicated online learning hub, *It Left No Marks*: www.itleftnomarks.com.au

At LWCHC we have made our site coordinator the Anti-Violence Project Officer (AVPO). The AVPO is responsible for updating the LWCHC's Domestic and family violence policy to include sexual violence more extensively, developing specific protocols and practice manuals in consultation with staff, and expanding service-wide screening tools, including one for strangulation and sexual choking.

At the conclusion of this two-year project, the AVPO will transition into a case manager position with the capacity to support a full caseload of women requiring health-specific n eeds following non-fatal strangulation.

With the project resources indicating sexual choking is particularly prevalent among younger cohorts, LWCHC have prioritised raising awareness and providing health promotion to adolescents and young people. Following a train-the-trainer session for site coordinators provided by Women's Health NSW, the AVPO has developed a plan that will include training, in-service presentations, and networking with local organisations that work with adolescents and young people.

It is hoped that increasing LWCHC's reach with adolescent specific services will drive increased engagement and presentation by young people at LWCHC relating to their sexual health and wellbeing. This is an evolving space.


NO MORE: NATIONAL RALLY AGAINST VIOLENCE

The Centre is exceptionally grateful for this support as there is currently not enough room in the building for all our service provision and counselling space for the organisation is a pressing issue.






OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS


