#### **OUR MISSION**

Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre is a **leader** and **innovator** in the delivery of evidence informed **health services**. We partner with other organisations to meet the needs of **women** who are at **risk** of poorer health or do not access the mainstream health system. Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre is a multidisciplinary primary health centre with five clinic locations, health education provided across 126 square kilometres of Sydney's inner city, inner west and south west, and a specialist state-wide counselling service.

Our focus is the provision of traumainformed, affordable services that are sensitive to the needs of women with complex health issues or recovering from violence and abuse.

The centre's safe, welcoming environment aims to encourage women to make their own informed health care decisions and feel empowered to live healthy and fulfilling lives.



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During 2016-17, the centre provided multi-disciplinary health care on over 22,554 occasions to women, most of whom were living in local communities and experiencing financial disadvantage. 99% of women attending clinical and counselling services presented with multiple health issues.

#### **OUR FUNDING**

LWCHC is a non-government and not for profit women's health service run by women, for women. In 2016-17 81% of funding was provided by Sydney Local Health District, NSW Ministry of Health. The centre has six funding programs, three from the NSW Health NGO Grants Program: Women's Health/ Kids and Families, Drug and Alcohol and AIDS Infectious Diseases and Sexual Health; Medicare bulk-billing funds the doctors' clinics, physiotherapy is fee for service and bequests assist access for women on low incomes. A smaller amount of independent income is received from donations and oneoff grants enhance service delivery.

#### **PAYMENT DETAILS**

- Doctors: Medicare bulk-billed.
- Nurse: Medicare for pathology.
- Acupuncture, naturopathy, drug and alcohol counselling and relationship counselling: \$10 or \$5 per visit (these services are for women living within Sydney Local Health District – see map opposite).
- Naturopathy costs average \$20-\$80 per visit depending on the prescription.
- Health education: \$10 or \$5 (concession)/ session.
- Physiotherapy: fees, cancellation fee applies. Registered with private health insurance; clients with chronic health conditions may be eligible for Medicare.

We work with women and girls to *change* their social determinants of health.

The social determinants of health are the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age. These circumstances are shaped by the distribution of money, power and resources at global, national and local levels. The social determinants of health are mostly responsible for health inequities – the unfair and avoidable differences in health status seen within and between countries.






#### Graph 1: Client Age 2016-17

#### Graph 2: Client Financial Status 2016-17






#### Graph 4: Client Ability 2016-17

#### **PRESENTING HEALTH ISSUES**

Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre uses the Women's Health NSW statistical data base which captures **157** presenting issues in clinical and counselling services. In 2016-17 a total of **38,390** presenting issues and **4,828** client contacts were recorded in the data base.

#### GETTING THE BASICS RIGHT – THE SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH

Many of our clients have complex issues that require attention before health care or counselling can be effective. Our staff work with each other, accessing skills and knowledge across modalities, to reestablish the foundations for health and wellbeing.

Our services are informed by evidence and align with the NSW Health Framework for Women's Health, NSW State Plan and other relevant local, state and national policies.

SOS Women's Services has continued its advocacy on behalf of women and girls in NSW to strengthen and improve Government responses to domestic violence and trauma, and ensure women and girls have safe places and the support they need. During the year we had meetings with Minister for Health Hon. Brad Hazzard MP to discuss our proposals to:

- Establish Domestic Violence
   Prevention Clinics a first in
   Australia at 17 women's health
   centres in NSW. The proposed clinics
   would provide earlier intervention
   and support the large numbers of
   women who don't access crisis
   services and police
- Update women's domestic violence refuges from communal living to self-contained units starting with four pilot sites and accepting a generous offer from The Sebastian Foundation to be involved
- Establish new regional women's health centres with Domestic
   Violence Prevention Clinics in Griffith, Broken Hill and Tamworth.

#### LIVING FREE FROM ABUSE

The centre adopts a multifaceted approach in addressing violence against women which includes recovery from trauma, identifying opportunities for prevention, strengthening referral pathways, and support at court. In the year, we:

- Provided health care and counselling regarding violence on over 3,798 occasions
- Incorporated healthy relationships information into courses for 161 women
- Participated in sector capacity building initiatives including as a member of Sydney Local Health District Domestic Violence Committee and the auspice and treasurer for Leichhardt Marrickville Domestic Violence Liaison Committee

- Provided assistance to 72 women at Newtown, The Downing Centre and Sydney Family Law courts
- Continued our collaboration with Inner West Council on domestic violence prevention campaign 'Speak Out' and through membership of the Respectful Relationships Steering Committee
- Fostered ongoing partnerships benefitting survivors – Rape & Domestic Violence
   Services Australia, Gowland Legal, Medicare registered psychologist Madhu Misra and psychiatrist Dr Anne Noonan
- Maintained momentum with SOS Women's Services advocating for improvements to the service system for women and children.

#### EGG - EMPOWERING GIRLS TO GROW - CAREER MENTORING

We are thrilled to have been awarded Impact100 Sydney's inaugural grant to improve the lives of young people experiencing disadvantage. The grant is enabling us to realise a long-held dream – to develop and run a career mentoring program for girls who are living in Sydney's girls' refuges.

The two year program will enable 40 girls aged 16 and 17 to experience a unique 10 step vocational course with one on one mentors. In the first six months 10 girls had already completed and in other early indicators success:

 Every girl who's finished has met her goals and is more engaged in school

- All the graduates have been offered ongoing work experience with their mentors, either paid or voluntary
- Every girl has been matched with a high quality mentor in her chosen field

In addition to the generosity of the vocational mentors, Price Waterhouse Coopers is mentoring each girl on CV development, Taronga Zoo has offered to mentor four girls a year and assist girls to access its prestigious YATZ volunteer program for teenagers, and charity Bounce is working with us to find graduates paid employment. #### **REVIEWING OUR IMPACT**

Several measurements help assess the effectiveness of our service delivery including the K10, MyMop, DASS, tailor-made feedback surveys and, once every three years, the cefp Practice Accreditation and Improvement Survey. In the past 12 months:

- 86% of clients using validated measurements reported their health had improved as a result of services received
- 97% of women in women's health funded counselling reported improvements
- 78% of drug and alcohol counselling clients reported improvement in their emotional mental health
- 98% of women in women's health funded health education reported increased knowledge and confidence in using it
- 99% of women in drug and alcohol health education reported increased knowledge and confidence
- 100% of Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service counselling and support group clients reported increased awareness of strategies to negotiate safe sex
- 100% of the 16 tertiary students gained a high level of knowledge about the social model of health.

97% of all women accessing services were very or completely satisfied

#### **QUALITY ASSURANCE**

- Developed Memoranda of Understanding with Kathleen York House and WHOS New Beginnings creating smooth pathways into counselling and health services
- Researched options for domestic and family violence screening, developed a comprehensive policy and piloted the Common Risk Assessment Framework tool to 122 clients
- Trained staff in the use of the Domestic
   Violence Safety Assessment Tool (DVSAT)
- Updated Governance and Management and Financial Management policies
- Resumed women's health physiotherapy clinics with a new fee-paying approach and low cost options
- Improved IT thanks to support from Inner West Council and the Federal Government Stronger Communities programs
- Embarked on a new two year career mentoring program for young women in Sydney's girls' refuges, see page 9.

#### **WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP**

We focus on partnerships as a way to achieve the best outcomes for our clients. **212** partnerships and referral pathways were maintained including our in-house partnerships (see page 18) and the support of Impact100 Sydney has enabled us to create the new two year career mentoring program for residents of The Girls Refuge and Lillians. Other valuable partnerships include Rape and Domestic Violence Services Australia, providing trauma counselling; Canterbury City Community Centre, Navitas, Metro MRC and WHOS New Beginnings allowing us to provide nurse clinics on their premises; The Miranda Project, Kathleen York House, Detour House, and the many GPs, NGOs and private practitioners who trust us with their clients.

We provided **2,832** referrals to a wide range of services including GPs, medical specialists, hospital outpatient clinics, allied health, counsellors, Breastscreen, sexual health clinics, family support services, women's drug and alcohol residential services, refuges, police and services for financial, legal, employment and education assistance.

Our contributions towards sector capacity building continued with our involvement in Women's Health NSW Database Subcommittee, WHNSW Research Reference Group, NADA Women's AOD Network, Sydney LHD Domestic Violence Committee, Leichhardt Marrickville DV Liaison Committee, Inner West Council Respectful Relationships Steering Committee and the new Sydney Local Health District Domestic Violence Symposium.

#### A LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

**16 students** were on placement during the year, ten in long term placements. Placements included University of Sydney Bachelor of Medicine (3rd year) and Masters of Nursing, University of Newcastle Bachelor of Medicine (3rd and 5th year), Australian Catholic University Bachelor of Applied Public Health (4th year), ACNT Bachelor of Health Science Nutritional Medicine and Australian College of Natural Therapies.

#### Staff attended 29 professional

development programs which included E-Health, Social Media and Privacy and Dealing with Difficult Patients (Central and Eastern Sydney Primary Health Network), Women's Health Update (Health Ed), Good Governance (Moore Stephens), Domestic Violence in AOD Settings (NADA), Safety Action Meetings Training (Sydney WDVCAS), Effective Case Work and Case Management (ACWA/CCWT), Family Assessment (Karitane) and Violence Against Women in Refugee Communities (ECAV).

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Graph 8: New client referrals 2016-17




Graph 9: Website traffic generated on our website between 1 July 2016 and 30 June 2017

Nurse clinics are conducted in Leichhardt, Lakemba, Campsie, Marrickville and Rozelle's WHOS New Beginnings.







### **HEALTH EDUCATION**

Education programs are designed to enhance women's skills and build knowledge. Our health education is based on adult education principles and utilises evidence based strategies including CBT, Mindfulness, DBT, facilitated peer support and movement.

This year 1,458 women attended 88 programs on sexual health and wellbeing, stress management, communication skills, healthy body image, nutrition and harm minimization. Programs were delivered by health educators, registered nurses, physiotherapist, drug and alcohol worker and the naturopath.

Programs included: Getting to Grips with Distress, Breathing for Vitality, Meditation, Nia Dance Therapy, Art Therapy for Wellbeing, Mental Health and Wellbeing for Vietnamese women, Mind the Gut, Quit Smoking, Manage Your Moods and Self Care for Carers. In addition, 114 women attended therapeutic/ support groups conducted by the Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service.





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#### Graph 15: Drug & Alcohol Addictions Categories for D&A Counselling 2016-17




Graph 16: Client Age Drug & Alcohol Funded Counselling and Health Education 2016-17



#### **ALLIED HEALTH CARE**

Bequests have enabled physiotherapy and massage clinics to be established and have created access for women on low incomes. We sincerely appreciate the generosity of The Lisa Macdonald Fund donors in supporting these services.

#### WOMEN PARTNERS OF BISEXUAL MEN SERVICE

The Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service provides counselling, support and information to improve the sexual and emotional health of women in NSW whose male partners are same sex attracted. It is the only funded service of its kind.

**96%** of women were in heterosexual marriages spanning 8 to 52 years. **58%** were living in regional areas. Many have preschool or school aged children. There were **185** occasions of service in counselling regarding domestic and family violence, most often described as emotional and/or financial control, social isolation and threats to pets.

Graph 20: Website traffic generated on www.womenpartners.org.au between 1 July 2016 and 30 June 2017








#### ADDITIONAL SERVICES THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS
