

Underpinned by NSW Health's CORE values: Collaboration, Openness, Respect, Empowerment Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre is a multidisciplinary primary health centre with five clinic locations, health education provided across 126 square kilometres of Sydney's inner city, inner west and south west, and a specialist state-wide counselling service.

Our focus is the provision of traumainformed, affordable services that are sensitive to the needs of women with complex health issues or recovering from violence and abuse.

During 2015-16, the centre provided multi-disciplinary health care on over 20,694 occasions to women, most of whom were living in local communities and experiencing financial disadvantage.

The social determinants of health are the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age. These circumstances are shaped by the distribution of money, power and resources at global, national and local levels. The social determinants of health are mostly responsible for health inequities - the unfair and avoidable differences in health status seen within and between countries.

World Health Organisation, 2015 The centre's safe, welcoming environment aims to encourage women to make their own informed health care decisions and feel empowered to live healthy and fulfilling lives.

Our funding

LWCHC is a non-government and not for profit women's health service run by women, for women. In 2015-16 74% of funding was provided by NSW Ministry of Health, administered by Sydney Local Health District. The centre has six funding programs, three from the NSW Health NGO Grants Program: Women's Health/Kids and Families, Drug and Alcohol and HIV; Medicare bulk-billing funds the doctors' clinics, and physiotherapy and lymphatic drainage massage clinics are fee for service and bequests support women on low income. A smaller amount of independent income received from donations and smaller grants enhance service delivery.

Payment details

- Doctors: Medicare bulkbilled.
- Nurse: Medicare for pathology.
- Acupuncture, naturopathy, drug and alcohol counselling and relationship counselling:
 \$10 or \$5 per visit (these services are for women living within Sydney Local Health District – see the map on page 3).
- Naturopathy costs average \$20-\$80 per visit depending on the prescription provided.
- Health education: \$10 or \$5 (concession)/session.
- Physiotherapy and massage: fees, cancellation fee applies. Registered with private health insurance, physio clients with chronic health conditions may be eligible for Medicare.












Graph 4: Clients Ability 2015-16

Presenting health issues

Leichhardt Women's Community Health Centre uses the Women's Health NSW statistical data base which captures 151 presenting issues in clinical and counselling services. The data base recorded a total of 30,256 presenting issues and 4,445 client contacts for 2015-16.

Getting the basics right - the social determinants of health

To effect transformative and lasting improvement in health status, first some of the most basic foundations need to be addressed. Many of our clients come from complex, traumatic backgrounds that require attention before genuine health and wellbeing can be achieved.

Effectiveness and impact

We use a range of outcome measurements to evaluate the effectiveness of our health care strategies including K10, MyMop, DASS, cefp Practice Accreditation and Improvement Survey and LWCHC tailor-made feedback surveys.

- 91% of women surveyed for the cfep Practice Accreditation and Improvement Survey reported their experiences with the centre were excellent, very good or good. This survey compares results from 343,219 patients in 2,399 Australian general practices on access and availability, information provision, privacy and confidentiality, continuity of care, communication skills and staff interpersonal skills. The centre scored above 90% in all categories of the survey.
- 99% of women attending clinical and counselling appointments presented with multiple health issues
- 100% of acupuncture clients reported improvements in symptoms and 44.5% improvement in symptoms after four treatments
- 85% of naturopathy clients reported improvements in symptoms and 36% improvement in symptoms after four consultations
- 96% of drug and alcohol counselling clients reported improvement in their mental health as a result of counselling
- 90% of women in women's health funded health education reported increased knowledge and confidence in applying it
- 96.5% of women in drug and alcohol health education reported increased knowledge and confidence in applying it
- 96% of Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service counselling and support group clients reported increased awareness of strategies to negotiate safe sex
- 100% of drug and alcohol counselling clients dependent on alcohol, tobacco or other drugs had stopped, maintained abstinence, reduced or had learnt to be safer
- 482 new appointments were conducted for clinical and counselling services
- 100% of the 23 tertiary students reported increased knowledge of the social determinants of health and confidence in using their new knowledge



Preventing, recovering and thriving

The centre's work to address violence against women spans preventative strategies, strengthening referral pathways, decisionmaking, post crisis processing, support at court and clinical and counselling services.

- 1,031 occasions of service for domestic violence, 662 occasions of services for childhood sexual abuse and 400 occasions of service for sexual assault as an adult in the funded clinics and counselling services
- Membership of the Sydney Local Health District Domestic Violence Committee and the auspice for Leichhardt Marrickville Domestic Violence Liaison Committee
- Staff rostered at Newtown, Balmain and Downing Centre Courts provided assistance to 26 women
- Devoted a caseworker to the Sydney
 Women's Family Law Court Support Service and assisted 25 women

Advocating for women's services in NSW

SOS Women's Services has

continued its advocacy on behalf of women and girls in NSW to strengthen and improve Government responses to domestic violence and trauma, and ensure women and girls have safe places and the support they need

Following its success over the past two years, this year SOS successfully lobbied for all refuges to have their funding extended until 2020 to allow the sector to rebuild after reforms, helped secure \$20 million in additional funding to assist with the expansion of 24 hour services across NSW, and successfully advocated for the continuation of the Women's Family Law Court Support Service with the support of the Chief Justice. We also submitted proposals to:

- Establish Domestic Violence
 Prevention Clinics a first in Australia

 at every women's health centre in
 NSW to complement the traditional
 crisis system and provide access to
 the large numbers of women who
 don't access crisis services
- Update women's domestic violence refuges from communal living to selfcontained units starting with four pilot sites and accepting a generous offer from The Sebastian Foundation to be involved
- Create a coaching and career mentoring program for disadvantaged young women aged 16-17 who are residents of Sydney's girls' refuges

Working partnerships

Collaborating with community members and organisations is essential to our work. This year our team took part in **91 case conferences** to facilitate coordinated care for clients with complex needs.

208 partnerships and established referral pathways include new Memoranda of Understanding with Dr Anne Noonan for psychiatric/counselling clinics, being a pilot site for The Miranda Project, auspiced by Community Restorative Centre, and opening a fifth nurse-led clinic at WHOS New Beginnings. Partnerships provide flexibility in service delivery and enable us to reach some of the most marginalised women. Highly effective partnerships include our relationships with Canterbury City Community Centre, Navitas and Metro MRC, Gowland Legal, Marrickville Women's Refuge, Rape & Domestic Violence Services Australia, Kathleen York House, Detour House, The Girls Refuge, the many local GPs and our in-house psychologist Madhu Misra.

1,810 referrals were provided to GPs, medical specialists, allied health, counsellors, Breastscreen, sexual health clinics, family support services, women's drug and alcohol residential services, refuges, police, hospitals, financial, legal and employment services.

Our commitment to **sector capacity building** continued through our involvement in Women's Health NSW Database Subcommittee, WHNSW Communications Committee, WHNSW Research Reference Group, NADA Women's AOD Network, Sydney LHD Domestic Violence Committee, Leichhardt Marrickville DV Committee and Inner West Council Respectful Relationships Steering Committee.

A learning environment

Seven tertiary students were accepted for placements to assist their studies in Medicine, Social Work and Naturopathy and a further 16 students in nursing and counselling were helped with projects. Placements included University of Sydney Medicine (3rd year), University of Western Sydney Medicine (4th year), University of Sydney Bachelor of Social Work (4th year), ACAP Master of Social Work and BA Health Science Naturopathy.

Staff attended **56 professional** development programs which included

Principles in Practice Supporting Adult Survivors of Complex Trauma and Working Therapeutically for People with Complex Trauma (Blue Knot Foundation), Domestic Violence Safer Pathways DVSAT, DV Alert Multicultural Training Program, Attachment Theory and Developments, Acceptance and Commitment Therapy, CPR and 16 courses in clinical governance and administration with Central and Eastern Sydney Primary Health Network and GPA Accreditation plus.



Graph 9: Website traffic generated on our website between 1 July 2015 and 30 June 2016













Health education

Health education programs are designed to increase women's skills and knowledge to be more involved in their own health care. Health education utilises a range of evidence based strategies including Cognitive Behavioural Therapy, Mindfulness, Dialectical Behavioural Therapy, facilitated peer support and exercise.

This year 2,122 women attended 105 programs on sexual health and wellbeing, stress management, domestic violence and healthy relationships, communication skills, healthy body image, nutrition, harm minimisation and parenting. Programs were delivered by health educators, registered nurses, physiotherapist, drug and alcohol worker and the naturopath. In addition, 101 women attended therapeutic support groups conducted by the Women Partners of Bisexual Men Service.

Programs included: Improving Your Pelvic Floor, Healthy Relationships, Nia Dance Therapy, Art Therapy for Wellness, Stand Up Straight Posture Workshop, Physical Activity and Mental Health, Quit Smoking, Mindfulness - Letting Go of Worries, Breathing for Vitality, Meditation, Manage Your Moods, 123 Magic and Self Care for Carers.






Graph 17: Client Location by Local Health District Drug & Alcohol Funded Counselling and Health Education 2015-16







Allied health care

Bequests and donations have subsidised access to the physiotherapy and lymphatic drainage massage clinics for women on low incomes. We sincerely appreciate the generosity of The Lisa Macdonald Fund donors in supporting these services.

94% of women being treated by the physio and massage therapist were on disability benefits, students or not currently employed. Fees are benchmarked against other services and subsidised.


Graph 24: Highest Presenting Issues 2015-16 (All Counselling Sessions) - Total Presenting Issues: 3,169




Graph 27: Client Country of Birth 2015-16 (Face-to-face/Skype counselling and Sydney support groups)


Partnerships
